FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

Dear Parish Family,

Blessings on Australia Day. I realise that this day is controversial. There are those who love Australia Day 26 January and there are those for whom this is a divisive, not unifying, and a painful day. We



are called to respect the views of those who may not agree with us. Regardless of our position it is a day to acknowledge that we belong to a wonderful nation and a country of many graces. I know we are not perfect, so it is also a day to work on some of those things we need to change to make us better. We acknowledge our first nations people. Welcome to our refugees and migrants – hopefully you have been welcomed – refugees are not illegal immigrants. We have much to work on. May God always bless our country and all of us who live here.

I understand you already know that we are bound by several compliance and governance policies – we live and minister in a modern world and are bound to follow those 'rules'. I don't always like them, but I know the intent is safety, they are designed to protect in the first instance our people - safety of our community is paramount. What we did even 20 years ago can be problematic now. We can't always do what we have always done. Our risks must be assessed for



Covenant

The structure of the Beatitudes can be seen as yet another attempt by God to re-establish a covenant between Godself and the people. Throughout Jewish history, God called the people back into relationship and re-established God's covenant with them. Like all the previous versions of the covenant, the Beatitudes contain both a series of demands and a series of promises. It is a two-way deal. The first part of each Beatitude is a statement of what the people are called to do and the second part is God's promise of how they will be rewarded for their right action.

the benefit of the church, the people we minister to. Breaches can put our insurance at risk if we don't follow the appropriate legislation. We need people with the appropriate trades to fix some things, we must be mindful of appropriate footwear, clothing, etc – you can't climb ladders over a certain height. The rules apply in the same way for the other organisations you belong to or organisations you work for.

Copyright of course plays a big part of being compliant and as it turns out it is doing the right thing. Intellectual property has the same protections as physical property. We can all be a bit slack about that – we photocopy articles, music, artwork and hand it to our friends or leave it at the back of the church to share. It may well be understandable, and it has a generosity about it. When we do some of these things in the public domain it becomes problematic. If you would please check before you leave something at the door of the church so that I can make sure it is okay.

You may not know that we add copyright to everything we print. We check to ensure it is covered by our licence. We also count the number of copies. Each week or month depending on our setup those numbers and the hymns used are sent into our licencing company; it is a licence related to the numbers of people who attend our Masses as well. Every liturgy is included: weddings, funerals, baptisms, all masses. Every time we use printed lyrics we must record its use. It is important to not only acknowledge the artist but also to make sure they are paid for what they have produced. For some it is their only source of income. When we don't record correctly what we have used we run the risk of negating our licence and incurring a huge fine; you may not necessarily recognise it for what it is; however, it is theft. I am the responsible person. I must worry about it, which means my office staff have to worry about it. It also should mean you have to be mindful of it. It is important.

Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

To follow Jesus does not mean merely that one travels with him from place to place. It means that one learns from him, that one follows his manner of life and his way of thinking. To follow Jesus means to follow his example in the way he respects himself and other people, in his use of the things of the natural world. It means that one listens to what he says, and asks for an explanation when what he says is not understood. All of this requires that the disciple be a learner, one who can learn from the life of Jesus as well as from his teaching.

The first lessons that the disciples must learn are found in the beatitudes. The same lessons are placed before us, the modern-day disciples. The setting of Jesus' teaching is so serene; a mountain apart, a teacher with his disciples gathered around him, simple statements that are coupled with glorious rewards. However, the reality of the lessons is in stark contrast with this tranquil scene. These beatitudes, these blessings call for profound inner transformation.

The gospel outlines the kind of person the disciple is to become; the psalm sketches the program to which the learner is called. The disciples of Jesus are not merely his followers; they also continue the work that he began. In whatever circumstance of life we find ourselves, as disciples of Jesus we work to sustain the good that is in the world and to transform whatever needs transformation.

LATEST NEWS FROM OUR SAFEGUARDING PROMOTERS

The Promoters of Safeguarding continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within the Parish. To this end, we mention the dangers of information technology (IT) presents for children.



IT-related presents, such as smartphones, tablets, and gaming consoles, can pose dangers to children if not managed carefully. Prolonged screen time can lead to health issues like eye strain, poor sleep, and reduced physical activity. Unrestricted internet access exposes children to inappropriate content, online predators, and cyberbullying. Social media apps may harm their mental health, fostering unrealistic comparisons and anxiety. Online gaming platforms often include in-app purchases, potentially leading to financial risks.

Without proper security measures, children may fall victim to scams, malware, or identity theft. Excessive use of IT devices can hinder social skills and family interactions. Parents should monitor usage, implement parental controls, and educate children about online safety. Balancing screen time with offline activities and fostering open communication about digital habits can help mitigate these risks, ensuring technology enhances rather than harms children's well -being.


FOOD BASKETS FOR THE NEEDY
